“PROMOTING EMPLOYEE VOICE IN THE NEW AMERICAN ECONOMY”



Professor Kenneth Dau-Schmidt is a nationally recognized teacher and scholar on the subjects of labor and employment law and the economic analysis of legal problems.

His innovative teaching methods using classroom simulations have been widely featured in publications including the *Christian Science Monitor*, *Chronicle of Higher Education*, the *Chicago Sun-Times*, the *National Jurist*, and the *Indiana Daily Student*. In 2003 he was awarded the Leon H. Wallace Award, Indiana University’s Maurer School of Law top teaching award, and IU’s Sylvia Bowman Award for Teaching Excellence. He received the Excellence in Education Award of the Industrial Relations Research Association in 2004.

Professor Dau-Schmidt is author of six books and numerous articles on labor and employment law and the economic analysis of law, and he frequently presents papers at academic conferences and law schools across the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia. In 1990 he received the Scholarly Paper Award from the Association of American Law Schools for his work on the economic analysis of criminal law as a preference-shaping policy. Professor Dau-Schmidt is active in law school administration, most recently serving as the Associate Dean of Faculty Research. He was also the chair or cochair of the law school’s Center for Law, Society and Culture from 2003 to 2007 and has been an active participant in the Committee on Institutional Cooperation (CIC) and IU leadership programs.

Involved in several national academic associations, Professor Dau-Schmidt was elected to the National Council of the American Association of University Professors and appointed to serve on the executive and litigation committees of that organization. He is currently chair of the Labor Law Group and has chaired the Association of American Law Schools’ sections on the Economic Analysis of Law and Socio-Economics. In addition, he has served in various capacities on the executive committee of the AALS section on Labor and Employment Law and the Industrial Relations Research Association’s section on Labor and Employment Law. He is also a founder of the Midwest Law and Economics Association.
